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
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# CANTERBURY TALES AUGUST 2023

### BACKPACK/BRIEFCASE BLESSING AUGUST 6





#### A Meditation: Romantic Rationalism

My meditation this month will be a little different. I usually write it as a thought piece about one or more of the scripture readings from the month's lectionary. This will be a more introspective self-exploration of a topic that I encountered in an online presentation recently. In this presentation, the speaker was talking about the ideas of British spiritual writer C.S. Lewis. Many people know Lewis as the author of the *Narnia* series, which was a Christian allegory of the Gospel written so as to be accessible to younger readers. He is also famous for his book *Mere Christianity*.

The presenter described Lewis' approach to the world, his spirituality, as being an example of "romantic rationalism." The remainder of this meditation will include a dose of philosophy and literary theory, and my personal reflection about what Lewis' romantic rationalism means for my own spiritual reflection.

Lewis is a romantic in the sense that his Christianity is suffused with feelings of joy and love, and because of his ability to perceive a liminal, light-filled world that goes beyond the merely physical or material. It might be a stretch to use this word, but it is a world that contains magic, and not merely "stuff." On the other hand, Lewis was an atheist as a young man, and was a trained academic – eventually becoming an "Oxford Don," a literature professor at Oxford University (alongside J.R.R. Tolkein, the author of the *The Hobbit* and *The Lord of the Rings* books). As was appropriate for this role, Lewis was adept at using facts and logic in his writings and his arguments – thus the label as a rationalist. Given these two modes of Lewis' thought, drawing from the ethos of both the Romantic and the Naturalistic periods in English literature, it is fair, I think, to label his thought as romantic rationalism.

So, two questions remain. First, how can these sometimes polar and contradictory approaches be combined in one person? And second, what does that mean for me, as I reflect on my own spirituality?

Lewis was able to accept the outcomes of scientific observations and experimentation, and he was able to accept history (interpretation aside) as being demonstrable and

verifiable. Yet, he also fully accepted the idea that miracles happened in history. When asked if he was a fundamentalist, he responded:

"I have been suspected of being what is called a Fundamentalist. That is because I never regard any narrative as unhistorical simply on the ground that it includes the miraculous. Some people find the miraculous so hard to believe that they cannot imagine any reason for my acceptance of it other than a prior belief that every sentence of the Old Testament has historical or scientific truth. But this I do not hold, any more than St. Jerome did when he said that Moses described Creation "after the manner of a popular poet" (as we should say, mythically) or than Calvin did when he doubted whether the story of Job were history or fiction. The real reason why I can accept as historical a story in which a miracle occurs is that I have never found any philosophical grounds for the universal negative proposition that miracles do not happen" (Reflection On the Psalms).

In this sense, I fully agree with Lewis. I actually see the Universe itself as the "miracle of miracles." There is no scientific explanation for its existence in the first place. And even if science can come to understand the physics of what preceded the "Big Bang," that will not answer the question of what came before that. This is what philosophers might call the "infinite regress." I also accept that miracles have occurred within natural history (e.g., the birth, life, death and resurrection of Jesus). But scientific knowledge must be accounted for and cannot simply be wished away.

So, scientific results must be accounted for (while understanding that future discoveries might well overturn presently-accepted results). And events in history must be validated as best we can by corroborating evidence, artifacts, and ethnocultural context. Yet, miracles do occur (or have occurred) in history. And those are signposts that point to God. And the two miracles that I wholeheartedly accept as such are the Universe, and Jesus.

But what do you think?
